A Tribute to Our Co-Founder and Chairman of the SOFT tribe, Mr. Herman Chinery-Hesse (November 18, 1963 – September 17, 2024)

A week prior to his untimely passing, Google named one of its conference rooms at its headquarters, the Chinery-Hesse Conference Room, in recognition of his significant contributions to information technology in Ghana and West Africa.

Tuesday 17th September 2024 dealt us at the SOFTtribe, organizations and persons across Ghana, Western Africa and several other parts of the world a heavy blow. We woke to the news that the Co-Founder and Chairman of the SOFT tribe (implementing partner of AgriConnect), Herman Chinery-Hesse had passed. Mr. Chinery Hesse was considered a global "tech giant", strategic thinker with a vibrant and larger-than-life personality. He was a firm believer and advocate for Ghana and Africa realizing its full potential by pursuing development that is bolstered by technology.

the SOFT tribe is the oldest and largest software company in Ghana and quite possibly West Africa, employing over 70 persons, and has a client base of more than 250 organizations, including multinational corporations such as the Ford Foundation, Nestlé, and Unilever as well as several government agencies in Ghana and other parts of Africa. the SOFT tribe has pioneered several groundbreaking products including: Hei Julor!!! a low-cost, mobile-based, mass market community security alert system for Africa; Government payroll systems; Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) software systems; nationwide utility billing

systems; point of sale (POS) systems; and electronic payment systems. These software solutions have always been tailored to the African market, making them topically relevant. the SOFT tribe is also a Microsoft development partner in the region.

10 Facts about Mr. Chinery-Hesse

- 1. A strong believer in the potential of his home country Ghana, and Africa as a continent.
- 2. He believed that technology was the path that Africa should pursue to advance its competitiveness and generate wealth. He is in fact quoted as saying. "If Africa misses the current global IT boat, there may never again be an opportunity for rapid wealth creation on the continent".
- 3. Under his chairmanship, the SOFT tribe has won several awards including the Millennium Excellence Awards for IT in 2005; the Ghana Club 100 Award for the Most Innovative Company; the "SMS" App of the Year Award; the Mobile World Lifetime Achievement Award and the Best Entrepreneur in Information and Communication Technology.
- 4. He was named one of "20 Notable Black Innovators in Technology", one of Africa's "Top 20 Tech Influencers", among the 2Top 100 Most Influential Africans of our Time", and one of the "Top 100 Global Thinkers" by *Foreign Policy Magazine*.
- 5. Over the years, he was a featured speaker at several prestigious universities including the *University of Oxford*, *Harvard Business School*, *Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania*, *Chatham House* and Tech4Africa.
- 6. He has also served as a technology and innovation advisor to many Ghanaian presidents.
- 7. He was fondly described as the "Bill Gates of Africa".
- 8. He was a TED Fellow and frequently featured in international media including *CNN*, *BBC* and *Al Jazeera*, and in publications such as the Ghana Business & Finance Times, *The Guardian*, *Forbes Africa*, *New African*, *IEEE Magazine*, *The Financial Times*, among many others on technology matters in Africa.
- 9. He received the Distinguished Alumnus Award from Texas State University (his alma mater), the first and currently only African recipient of the award.
- 10. At the time of his death, he was working on a project "African Echoes", which is aimed at creating African audio books for global consumption, ensuring that for the first time ever Africans can tell their own stories to a worldwide audience.

He leaves behind his dear family, friends, many colleagues worldwide and thousands of social media followers. May his soul rest in peace and may we never forget his many contributions to the tech world, his passion for innovation and his contribution to the advancement of Ghana, West Africa and other parts of the world.

A community of practice is made up of a group of people who share similar concerns or passions for something or have similar areas of focus and through this mechanism can learn from each other and benefit from frequent interactions. Through this COP we hope that participants of AgriConnect will promote the spread of best practices, develop people's professional skills, and help companies recruit and retain talent.

AgriConnect Launches Masterclasses

The AgriConnect Team launched its Masterclass series on July 8th at the University for Development Studies. The 3-day Masterclass series focused on Digital Literacy allowing participants to receive instruction in the following modules of the mandatory sections of the Digital Literacy Course as follows:

- Lecture 1: Module 2: Digital Literacy and the Digitalization of the Agricultural Sector
- Lecture 2: Module 4: Digital Health and Well-being
- Lecture 3: Module 5: Computer Fundamentals
- Lecture 4: Module 6: Troubleshooting and Problem Solving
- Lecture 5: Module 8: Online Safety and Security
- Lecture 6: Module 10: Email and Communication

To complete the Digital Literacy course all participants are required to take the 10 modules contained in Sections 1- 3 of the Digital Literacy Course. Students were also provided with a bonus Lecture – A Glimpse into the World of Artificial Intelligence (AI), which is one of the supplemental sections under the Digital Literacy course

About AgriConnect Masterclasses

- 1. AgriConnect Masterclasses have been developed as a strategy to support student engagement in the AgriConnect supplemental course content
- 2. The Masterclasses were also developed as the AgriConnect recognizes that some students may be experiencing difficulties while undertaking the courses, some are overwhelmed by the course content, and have never engaged in self-paced learning

At the end of the Masterclasses with UDS, 119 students - 69 males and 50 females completed the mandatory digital literacy course.





Two of the 119 students that completed the mandatory Digital Literacy course at UDS receive their certificate from the Mastercard Foundation and the SOFT tribe teams

Masterclasses challenge students to:



Spend 5 hours each day with us in the masterclass and spend some additional hours at home or in your spare time and complete the modules not covered in the masterclass.



Take the tests at the end of each module after you have reviewed the content covered in the Masterclass.



Review the additional modules, not taught in the masterclass and take the tests.



Receive your certificate at the end of a week

"The first time I heard of AgriConnect, I was a bit pessimistic, I had to learn more about it before participating. When I saw the courses, I was interested in Artificial Intelligence and Social Media Marketing. I needed to get access to the programme. I had a laptop, but then I said, maybe if I do not register and get the new laptop, I cannot participate in the courses. When I got the laptop, I could not participate in the online classes because of exams, but when we started the Masterclass last week, I heard last week that you can use the AI to create a movie for example, and most of the videos we are watching online use AI, so I went home, I tried to do a video with AI on my own and it worked!" Some Key Requirements of AgriConnect – Students that Received Devices Must Complete the 3 Supplemental Courses

All students that have received laptops and connectivity must enroll and complete the 3 supplemental courses. This means reviewing and studying the information provided through the PowerPoint Slide Decks, training manuals and videos and then taking the assessments at the end.





In the digital marketing module, I got 30/30 (100%)"



AgriConnect Launches its Internship Programme:

20 Students Complete Internship with Ghana's Tech Software Giant and AgriConnect Implementing Partner, the SOFT tribe

In July, AgriConnect launched its paid summer Internship Programme. Twenty students, 10 males and 10 females were awarded a 6-week virtual internship with the SOFT tribe. This virtual internship focused on supporting these interns to learn a new skill – website development. The internship was structured as follows:

Module 1: Introduction to Website Development

Module 2: Introduction to HTML5

In this module interns learned the basics of HTML5 and started with instructional videos on how to set up the development environment, discussed HTML5 basics like valid document structure, which elements can be included inside other elements, and which cannot, and discussed the meaning and usefulness of HTML5 semantic tags etc.

Module 3: Introduction to CSS3

In this module, interns learned the very basics of CSS3 and moved into some fairly advanced concepts like floating and CSS rule conflict resolution. The learned about the 'box model', background property, etc. The module ended with interns learning about Responsive Design using their own CSS code as well as learning about Twitter Bootstrap and its essential Grid System.

Module 4: Coding a Static Website

Interns discussed some of the basics of interacting with a client when managing a web site project.

Module 5: Introduction to JavaScript

In this module, interns focused on learning the fundamentals of the Javascript language and how the language works and the power of this tool, including the Javascript language features.

Module 6: Introduction to Content Management System (CMS)

Interns learned about Content Management Systems (or CMS).

AgriConnect views internships as a core component of students' academic and professional journeys, acting as the intersection of the two. It is through internships that students are actively engaged in the concepts and theories that they learn in the classroom and put their education into practice. It's also the mechanism for career discovery and self-discovery.



An internship is a form of experiential learning that integrates knowledge and theory learned in the classroom with practical application and skills development in a professional setting.



Internships give students/young graduates the opportunity to gain valuable applied experience and make connections in professional fields they are considering for career paths;



Internships give employers the opportunity to guide and evaluate talent.

Defining Internships

In September, AgriConnect will place a few interns with agriculture industry players as well as place another 20 interns at the SOFT tribe. All students selected

for internships would have completed the three AgriConnect supplemental courses.






Students Share their Views and Perspectives on their Internship


Overall how would you rate this internship?




One word that describes my internship experience?

The Mastercard Foundation Engagement with UDS



The AgriConnect and the Mastercard Foundation teams led an engagement with students and faculty at the University for Development Studies on July 15, 2024. The objective of the engagement was to hear firsthand from students and faculty about their experiences with AgriConnect, including:

- Their views and perspectives of the Programme
- Assessing whether AgriConnect is meeting the needs of the students and the university
- Issues and challenges that are being faced and how these are being addressed
- How AgriConnect may be contributing to students achieving their future goals
- Perspectives on the way forward for AgriConnect
- Capturing any best practices or lessons learned as well as recommendations on the way forward for AgriConnect
- Capturing testimonials from students and faculty may be useful to inspire others.

106 students – 70 males and 36 females from agriculture and agriculture adjacent departments at the University participated in the 4-hour engagement. The engagement was structured into 5 sessions as follows:

- Session 1: Welcome and Opening Remarks
- Session 2: Conversation with Students, the Mastercard Foundation and AgriConnect
- Session 3: An Engagement and Conversation with the Young Women of AgriConnect and the Mastercard Foundation
- Session 4: An AgriConnect Masterclass in Artificial Intelligence (AI)
- Session 5: A Dialogue with UDS Admin and Faculty

In her opening remarks on behalf of the Mastercard Foundation at the event, Dina Randrianasolo, Acting Director for Strategic Partnerships and Innovation at the Mastercard Foundation, shared the following:



"One of our greatest achievements at the Mastercard Foundation is transitioning over 7 million young people into dignified and fulfilling work. One of our special programmes is AgriConnect. It is noteworthy and special because it bridges the digital divide; it improves learning experiences to enhance agricultural outcomes; it empowers young women; and it opens opportunities for learning, innovation, and entrepreneurship. Education is the most powerful tool for change and the future of education is digital and that is why it is important to the Mastercard

Foundation that entrepreneurship and digital literacy is part of the AgriConnect Programme. I have three messages for you. Number one: You are not just beneficiaries of this programme, you are pioneers, you are the next generation of agricultural leaders, so embrace the power to innovate, transform and inspire others. Leadership is not a title; it is about bringing change in your own lives and to the lives of others. Number 2: Technology is a tool in your hands, and it will become a catalyst for progress. Use it to innovate, use it to find ideas, to connect with people, to fundraise, to access markets, to find new funding sources or new knowledge, even beyond agriculture to improve your lives and livelihoods. Number 3: Support each other. The journey to leadership is not solitary. Share knowledge, celebrate others and find strength by coming together. If you embrace this opportunity with confidence and passion, your potential will be limitless, and your impact will be profound."


Main Takeaways of the Mastercard Foundation with UDS Students and Staff

- Students want more Masterclasses and webinars such as the Girls in ICT Day event.
- Students other than those in agriculture and agriculture related courses are interested in AgriConnect. They are interested in the computers but also want to have access to the courses.
- The computer and internet connectivity were timely for many students, especially those in Level 400 to support them with the projects that they have to complete to graduate.
- There is a strong interest in the supplemental courses and there was evidence from the students that they are using the course content and can recognize how the content would help them in their future endeavors.
- Students and faculty believe that the AgriConnect programme would support students beyond their time at university given that many of them are engaged in small businesses (to support their studies).
- They view the content of many of the supplemental courses as being able to assist then with their businesses.
- Students viewed the price of the laptops and connectivity as affordable and in some cases cheap, leading them to initially thinking that the programme may be a scam.
- Both faculty and students request that a new course in sustainable agriculture be developed as a supplemental course.
- Students want the Mastercard Foundation to consider providing scholarships to AgriConnect and UDS students, similar to those offered at other universities across Ghana.
- There was a suggestion that girls should pay less for the programme than boys.

Students also shared with the Mastercard Foundation how their views and

perspectives of AgriConnect. About 100 students participated in a Mentimeter exercise to share their views and perspectives on AgriConnect with hhe Foundation. Some of the results are presented below:

AgriConnect is a Gender Responsive Programme – Exploring Some Gender Related Terms



The AgriConnect Programme was established as a gender responsive programme with a specific emphasis on ensuring the participation female students – reducing and eliminating any barriers or binding constraints that would limit their access to the Programme. At the Mastercard Foundation Engagement with the UDS, Ms. Maame Serwaa Dzamesi, Program Partner, Digital Economy, shared a message from the Foundation, emphasizing women's participation in the programmes of the Mastercard Foundation, and encouraging more women to explore the Foundation's programs including AgriConnect.



"I am encouraging the women that there are lot of opportunities, do not limit it to only agriculture production. There are value chains, there is storage, processing, marketing etc. Think along these lines and then look for the opportunities in the agricultural space." She also emphasized the role of ICTs in driving women's participation in the Agriculture sector, as it is an enabler, streamlining processes and driving efficiency: adding that "We (the

Foundation) strive to ensure that at least 70% of participants of the programmes supported by the Mastercard Foundation are women who can benefit from the resources of our programme. This is because there are higher barriers for women than there are for men and especially within the agriculture sector. The whole idea behind AgriConnect is to drive participation for young women to take up digital courses and agribusiness. I am happy to see the women even beyond this panel say they have been impacted by AgriConnect.

As part of a panel discussion, students shared their own views on gender equality and women's empowerment and the opportunities for women in agriculture in Ghana. A few of these views are presented below:

- There are opportunities for women in Ghana, although many women still believe that agriculture is for men. Women do not always show much interest in agriculture. (female student)
- In my community, when I was growing up, it used to be only our fathers that owned farms but today, the situation is not the same. I have a farm; my mother has one as well as my brothers. (female student)
- My mom used to help my dad to farm, and he would sell the produce and then decide how much to give to my mom. But now my mom owns her own

- farm. There is improvement as time goes on. (female student)
- Ladies play a key role in agriculture. When you go to the markets for example, it is the ladies that determine the price of produce. The men do the farming, and the women indicate how much they would pay them. (male student)

Some Key Gender Terms



Gender equality: Is considered to be a fundamental human right and is defined as equal ease of access to resources and opportunities regardless of gender, including economic participation and decision-making.

Gender transformative: Gender transformative strives to transform unequal gender relations to promote shared power, control of resources, decision-making and support for the empowerment of all genders equally

Gender blind: Ignores gender in policy and programme design, perpetuates the status quo, potentially worsening inequalities.

Gender discriminatory: Favours one gender in a manner that leads to a deepening of gender inequalities.

Gender responsive: Gender responsive identifies and addresses the differentiated needs of all genders; promotes equal outcomes and responds to practical and strategic gender needs.

Students Views and Perspectives on the Gender Responsiveness of AgriConnect



- AgriConnect focuses on gender equality because all the girls and boys that applied were given laptops and connectivity there was no discrimination, even when it came to distribution of the laptops. (female student)
- As a female, I was not left out, I was included in the programme. We were also encouraged to participate in the programme – lifting spirits. (female student)
- AgriConnect is bridging the gap between gender inequalities as before now
 we used to think that ICTs were for boys, and they are the experts when it
 comes to Microsoft and other applications. Through AgriConnect we are
 better able to understand how to use ICTs in our academic work. (female
 student)

- The value chain courses are helping us to see how to better engage in some industries and how we can better generate business ideas as women. (female student)
- AgriConnect is playing an important role in gender equality as they are supporting us to use ICT tools in agriculture. By being able to use ICT tools (e.g. drones etc.) in agriculture, more ladies are coming in agriculture. There will soon be equal amounts of men and women in the agriculture sector. (male student)
